#### SHELBY WETLANDS


Nature trails once graced the land beside reservoir #3, but years of neglect have left them overgrown and impassable. The Foundation awarded a \$10,000 grant to improve the walkability of trails and install signage. Residents and visitors will be able to hike the trails and enjoy nature.





### MARVIN MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND THE LITTLE BUCKEYE MUSEUM

With the financial assistance of a \$10,000 grant from the Foundation, Marvin Memorial Library and The Little Buckeye Museum have collaborated to entice people into the library with traveling exhibits that give a taste of both what the Little Buckeye has to offer, and the many treasures hiding in our library.



#### **BLACK FORK COMMONS PARK**

There is connection between vibrant downtowns and strong economic communities, so the Foundation has worked closely with the City of Shelby and the Community Improvement Corporation to devise a plan to boost three focal areas: Black Fork Commons Plaza; Main Street Streetscape; and Black Fork Trail and Stream Restoration. After having a clear vision for what the downtown can be, The Shelby Foundation board unanimously voted to financially support this endeavor by giving the largest gift ever awarded in Foundation history at \$250,000 for park improvements.

The board understands these focuses above are designing a sense of place that residents and visitors will flock to. The impact of our grants doesn't just improve today or tomorrow but for generations to come.

## SHELBY HOME AND PUBLIC HEALTH CONTINUES TO IMPACT SHELBY

Even though Shelby Home and Public Health (SHPH) closed their doors in early 2018, the nonprofit agency is still benefitting the people of Shelby.

When faced with the difficult realization that the agency would be unable to continue, the board made the decision to leave a legacy with The Shelby Foundation so that they could still provide aid to the community. At the board's direction, their significant contribution was designated to three areas: the already established Shelby Home and Public Health Endowment Fund, the Women's Fund, and the Foundation's Unrestricted Fund.

Shelby Foundation Director Carrie Kemerer shared her gratitude by stating, "Shelby Home and Public Health provided a great service and it was difficult to see the organization close but what a generous gesture to leave a lasting legacy and still positively impact the community."

#### 100 WOMEN FOR SHELBY

The Women's Fund of The Shelby Foundation brought 100 caring, giving women together who share a mutual goal of enriching the community. These women are known as "100 Women for Shelby" and they are making an impact on the community.

The annual \$100 membership fee to belong to "100 Women for Shelby" provided the necessary funds to allow the Women's Fund to support these programs and projects in 2019:

#### THE SHELBY FOUNDATION AWARDS \$62,500 IN SCHOLARSHIPS TO SHELBY SENIORS

On May 17th, Shelby Seniors were rewarded for their academic achievements during the annual recognition assembly. Because of the generosity of donors, \$62,500 from 22 scholarship funds housed at The Shelby Foundation was awarded to worthy graduates. While each fund has its own criteria for candidate selection, most are based on academic merit, financial need, community involvement, career choice, and extracurricular activities.

Scholarship recipients are determined by selection committees generally comprised of fund representatives and educators. While The Shelby Foundation oversees the processing of each scholarship, Foundation board members and staff do not take part of determining scholarship recipients.

### SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS REACH IMPRESSIVE MILESTONE

In just the last five years, graduating Shelby seniors have received over \$365,400 in scholarship money from funds managed by The Shelby Foundation.

This year, two scholarship funds have crossed an impressive milestone. The W.H. Moody and Layde F. Moody Scholarship and the John and Helen Yetzer Memorial Scholarship both have awarded over \$100,000 to deserving area students.

Upon her death, Mrs. Moody made a substantial, unrestricted gift to The Shelby Foundation and established a scholarship fund at the Shelby Board of Education. Shelby City Schools transferred the scholarship fund to The Shelby Foundation in 2004 to increase the investment power of the fund. Since being placed under the watchful eye of the Foundation, over \$110,000 has been awarded.

The John and Helen Yetzer Memorial Scholarship was created from a generous gift by Helen Yetzer, the youngest daughter of John and Helen, for the benefit of Shelby City Schools. The criteria established was financial need, grade point average, and attendance at St. Mary's elementary school.

Director Kemerer said, "This is a perfect example of community members who wished to give back to the community they loved. Their gifts are helping past, current, and future students to decrease the financial burden of higher education."

#### SHELBY YMCA ESTABLISHES ENDOWMENT FUND



The Paul D. Champion Fund of The Shelby Foundation has been a major source of support for many local organizations, and it is, once again, making a major impact in our community. At the fund representative's request, along

with the Foundation Board's approval, the fund will provide matching dollars to establish a perpetual endowment fund for the Shelby YMCA.

An endowment is a fund that holds its principal in perpetuity and only pays out a small portion, about 4 to 5 percent per year, that goes to operations and programs. Endowment investments have dual goals: to grow the principal and to generate income.

The YMCA Board is taking advantage of this generous opportunity and has set a goal to raise a minimum of \$250,000, which will be matched dollar for dollar by the generosity of the Paul D. Champion Fund. Over the next 18 months, the YMCA will leverage the match to raise funds that will provide a constant stream of revenue now and into the foreseeable future.
